Teachers Love New MRTI Grants

As part of our on-going support for Minneapolis Public Schools' teachers, MRTI allocates up to \$15,000 each year to provide scholarships for Minneapolis teachers and paraprofessionals who wish to pursue additional licensure or certifications. Earlier this Fall, an MRTI Board member proposed a second program, awarding grants to current Minneapolis teachers who have unmet classroom needs.

An application process was created, along with a way to publicize this new opportunity to active teachers. Thirty-three applications were received, and eleven grant winners selected, spanning elementary, middle and high school classrooms, special ed programs and a few non-traditional experiences as well.

As the grant winners have put their new purchases into use, our Board members have volunteered to visit their classrooms to see the results of our new program. Joanne Lambrecht visited Nancy Erickson's classroom at Folwell Performing Arts School and Larry Risser visited Katie Morris' classroom at Windom. Dave Rolek visited Jenny Lind to see the picture dictionaries and Nellie Stone Johnson to see the new color block rug in classroom use. The following reports and photographs tell the story.

"I recently had the pleasure of visiting Nancy Erickson's classroom at Folwell Performing Arts School. Nancy was one of the recipients of an MRTI grant this year. She used her grant money to purchase phonics books

for her students.

While I was there, the students were working independently and with volunteer tutors using the books. Miss Erickson and



A MINNESOTA TREASURE HUNT Fun by Car or Motorcycle by Bob Ryder



For the last several years, my son, Chris, and I have gone on a summer motorcycle trip – a treasure hunt. It's been really fun and you might enjoy it, too. And you don't need a motorcycle!

It all began when I purchased a book called <u>Tales of the Road – Hwy. 61</u>, written by Cathy Wurzer, a morning host on public radio KNOW 91.1 FM from 6:00 – 10:00 AM. An MRTI luncheon speaker several years ago, she is a graduate of Minneapolis South High

School and has traveled Hwy. 61 throughout her life.



All that's left of Taconite Harbor

The book follows the route of Hwy. 61 from the Canadian border to the Iowa border, but what makes it fun are all the interesting places that exist, or once existed, along the road. There are 60 of them in the book, including a

ghost town. Taconite Harbor, located between Shroeder and Little

Marais on the North Shore, was built by the Erie Mining Company for its employees in the 1950s. The town only exists now as weed- overgrown streets & curbs, a few street light poles and a wooded basketball court. Another stop on the route is a play-

ground built in 1963 by a grieving grandfather to honor his 4 year old grandson who was killed by a truck at the family's gas station business. A legendary watering hole, the Oaks Nite Club (not



pictured), the home of slot machines, free-flowing liquor and stories of gangster customers, was one we had trouble finding. Hugely popular back in the 30's and early 40's, it was (is) located near the small town of Minnesota City, just north of

Winona. On the National Register of Historic Places, the humble building pictured above left was the Willow River Rutabaga plant. Before being closed in 1955, the plant processed thousands of tons of rutabagas each year – ¼ of the national crop!

We didn't actually locate every single one: some were inaccessible, the roads having been permanently blocked off,

and some buildings were removed completely, replaced by something else. But we found most of them and enjoyed the hunt immensely.

One of the joys of this "treasure hunt" is that it can be done in segments to suit your convenience - anything from a day or two to a week or two at a time. You don't need a motorcycle. either; cars, bikes and rollerblades work just as well.


